


## Careers Week 2023.....it's all going on this week!

We are currently holding our annual 'Careers Week' and have invited a wide range of speakers into school to share their career pathways and occupations with the boys:



Monday: the Army Careers Team from the Oxford Armed Forces Careers Office (AFCO) talk about the different roles and routes into the Army, including the range of Apprenticeships offered as part of Phase 2 role-specific training.



On **Tuesday** we hosted Arcadis, the world's leading company delivering sustainable design, engineering, and consultancy services to the construction industry. Representatives from Arcadis gave a number of engineering focused talks and ran activities based around the skills required for engineering careers. We also had a practical challenge where students were given the brief to construct a paper bridge which could hold at least 500g – the strongest bridges held 3.5kg before running out of space for weights!



Wednesday: had the Army's STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) team in to run through a "Disaster Relief" scenario where students got to build, program operate and



robotic unit to carry out a number of humanitarian aid tasks,

and linking STEM learning in the classroom to different careers.

On **Friday** we had two events planned, one group of students will be heading to an "Open Doors" construction event run by the Sir Robert McAlpine Building Company, which will include an overview

of the work being completed on the site. They will be given a site tour by a member of the project team and then have the opportunity to speak with staff and subcontractors about the various roles in construction and their career paths.

Meanwhile, back in school Thames Valley Police are coming in to give a talk about career pathways and the role of the police.

All in all a rich and varied week with hopefully something to interest and inspire everyone!

## Lifesaving skills!

As part of the PSHE/RSHE programme the KS4 students have been learning to administer CPR and understand how defibrillators work as well as putting a casualty safely in the recovery position.

The course will enable students to know when and how to deliver CPR to an unresponsive casualty who is not breathing normally as well as to put a casualty that is breathing in the recovery position.

The course was co-delivered with the support of the School Nurse, Chrissy Stevenson, and Rachel Evans, who is a qualified First Aider. Here are some of the boys in action......





### Key Stage 5 Independence .....an insight into law and order!

Our current focus is 'staying safe' and within this, we have covered a range of topical issues which are in the national news such as the age of consent, county lines, cuckooing, modern slavery, and exploitation of both sexes across all ages. Our work included learning about the laws around these topics and how they protect us all, who to go to for help should they be in the unfortunate situation of falling victim, and what happens to those people who deliberately break the law. Arranging a Crown Court visit was then a natural progression for the boys to see how the judicial process works once a crime goes to trial stage. Despite the early start, everyone showed excellent time management skills by arriving promptly at 7:30 AM! Some even used navigation apps to guide staff to the venue by car or on foot. Upon arrival at the court, we witnessed the tight security measures in place, and we all had to pass through a metal detector and be searched. Although some students found this process unsettling, they all



coped well. We were then greeted by a court clerk, Emily Dowell, who took us on a tour of the cells.....this was quite an eye opener for all of us!

Most of the prisoners in Bullingdon prison are brought here for their trials. Upon arrival, they are searched for drugs before being escorted to a basic cell where they await their trial. Facilities include rooms for consultations with their legal representation, toilets, and a booking-in room where inmates processed, possessions taken away, and prison uniforms issued. Contrary to what is often portrayed on television, there are few outbursts during the court proceedings. Most offenders are in shock, stressed, and very emotional when they are found guilty.

The court has eight rooms, and we observed various trials going on during our visit. The public can attend these trials, sitting in the gallery behind the families of those who are accused. We were also taught how the jury system works, and we informed that having autism does not exempt one from jury service, although reasonable accommodations can be made. We were shown where the jury sit and it was explained how a guilty/not guilty verdict is reached, including the majority rule if not all jurors agree.

The courtrooms themselves are spacious, with the dock and jury seats obscured from the public gallery. The judges and counsels wear traditional horsehair wigs and colourful robes depending on their seniority and the type of trial they are presiding over. The language used is not commonly heard in everyday conversations, with one of our students describing it as "formal," but it adds to the solemnity of the occasion.

In summary, we were able to have a unique insight into the inside of a courtroom and how the judicial process takes place. It was a fabulous day out and we were treated with the upmost respect by the judge HHJ Sarah Campbell, Court Clerk Emily Dowell & the rest of the staff at the court.

## Work experience in action......



GB visits Sibford School Library

GB spent an afternoon volunteering in the library at Sibford, as he is keen to follow a career pathway in this line of work. It provided him with hands-on experience in various aspects of library work, such as cataloguing books, collecting data, budgeting, purchasing of books, as well as gaining an understanding of how libraries are multi-use ensuring the space is used as efficiently as possible. He found the whole experience beneficial and enjoyable. GB impressed the Sibford school librarian with his keenness, knowledge, and manners and was a fabulous ambassador for our school.

LT and SM have been participating in work experience at the Stagecoach bus depot since October half term. They completed the same induction as all new employees of the company would and have since been working across different departments. Their work has

included:

- monitoring bus schedules and operations from the control room at both Banbury and Oxford,
- handling money and ensuring schedules are maintained while working on the buses,
- inputting driver hours in the admin department,
- ordering mechanical parts for the buses from the storeroom and
- cleaning the buses with the cleaners.

Over the coming weeks they will have the opportunity to learn more about the Stagecoach driving school and will assist in maintaining the buses. As you can imagine this work experience opportunity provides valuable hands-on experience for L and S, allowing them to develop new skills and learn about different aspects of the company. Well done both of you for all your hard work!




## A trip out to the Warner Brothers studio ...with an added twist!

Thanks once again for all the support during our recent annual residential Ofsted inspection, it was very much appreciated by us all. This time round we only had one inspector who arrived on site on Monday lunchtime and stayed until Thursday afternoon. Rob received the call at 9.00 am on the Monday and that got the inspection up and running!



The inspection framework (National Minimum Standards for Residential Specials Schools) includes 27 standards which cover all aspects of our residential provision. The resulting report is then organised under three main headings:


- Safeguarding,
- Student welfare, progress and outcomes
- Leadership and Management

The inspector spent his time on site gathering information and evidence from a range of sources including school records and practice, talking to students, staff, governors and families as well as spending time with students in the evenings to get a sense of relationships within the school and joining in a range of activities.

We were very pleased with how the inspection was conducted in such a student and family-centered way, which mirrors our QoL approach.

At the end of the inspection, we received verbal feedback from the inspector, and we are now awaiting his report. There is often a delay between the inspection visit and the publication of the report as Ofsted need to follow their own Quality Assurance procedures. Whilst we are not at liberty to divulge the individual or overall judgments, we were delighted with the outcome and look forward to sharing the report with you as soon as we receive it.

## Family Quality of Life.... more good news sharing!

As usual, we thought you might like to read some of the comments from the Family Quality of Life section in the Spring Term Annual Review reports. Naturally, these are lovely comments for us to read, but most importantly they are the result of collaborative working between home and school, through a combination of QoL surveys, keyworking and regular communication.

We collated some of the comments for the recent inspection in order to illustrate the impact of our QoL framework and approach on family life and these were really helpful for the inspector....so thank you!

(He) is now able to take public transport (Bus) independently, although under supervision and being tracked.

(He) is better able to manage his emotions at home, which has helped us all. His school has been very supportive.

He is keen to do the homework school occasionally suggests, he practices at home. Again school has been very supportive.

(He) has been able to recognise and talk about some of his fears and worries, while also drawing on strategies to help him regulate his emotions.

It is a pleasure spending time with (him) as he is witty and engaging. His confidence in his own voice has really grown and he will often have us roaring with laughter. He is also very thoughtful and caring to everyone around him.

(He) is motivated to perform chores at home, such as tidying and cleaning the house. He likes to keep busy and is extremely helpful.

We can meet up with friends and have (him) contribute to our conversation rather than shy away. Friends have noticed a vast improvement in his self-confidence. We can relax and enjoy these social situations knowing (he) is happy and at ease.

We will keep sharing Annual Review comments like those above as they are fabulous illustrations of improvements in Quality of Life and provide powerful evidence in Annual Review reports.

Thank you for sharing them with us and to all parents who completed their December QoL surveys, your input really helps keyworkers to have a full understanding of how things are at home. Please do not hesitate to contact your keyworker for support if you have any concerns or thoughts about areas of focus for this term or how we might be able to support Family Quality of Life.

## What's going on with the QoL network?



We held our most recent QoL workshop here at SPS at the end of January which was a great success and are now preparing for our next event which is an online meeting next Tuesday.

One of the agenda items is how we mapped our QoL framework and approach against the inspection framework for residential special schools, and another item is an update of a keyworking best practice booklet which Tony Burtenshaw, our 'Quality of Life' Manager, has collated. This is a really helpful resource for us to use in school and to share with other schools who are also adopting a keyworking system. We discussed the QoL network during our recent inspection and this work was looked upon very favourably. We showed the inspector some of the resources we have developed, our small-scale action research projects and articles written for journals, including the most recent contribution Poppy made to a piece of international research, which relates to the presentation Kiran and Rob gave with Prof Eapen in Dubai before Christmas.

Congratulations to Poppy who contributed on our behalf, to a chapter with Prof Eapen (author of the QoLA) and her colleagues which was published in Frontiers Psychology:

I am pleased to inform you that the manuscript "Quality of life in parents of autistic children: A transcultural perspective" has been approved for production and accepted for publication in Frontiers in Psychology, section Developmental Psychology. Proofs are being prepared for you to verify before publication. We will also perform final checks to ensure your manuscript meets our criteria for publication (https://www.frontiersin.org/about/review-system#ManuscriptQualityStandards).

SPS prides itself in sharing our best practice and this underpins our charitable objectives.

It is also a pre-requisite these days for maintaining an Outstanding judgement from Ofsted.


